Behaviour

Our academy approach to behaviour is positive and places an emphasis on praise, encouragement and rewards for making good choices. Our basic expectations for developing good learning habits are rooted in our core values of **STRIVE**:

Success:	Stay on task in lessons
Togetherness:	Be on time
Respect:	Listen when others are speaking
Independence:	Have the basic equipment with you for all your lessons
Versatility:	Use the correct presentation and learning skills for each subject
Effort:	Ensure homework is handed in on time and to a good standard

We expect all our students to;

- Treat others with respect, in keeping with the ethos of our academy
- Be polite and helpful to others
- Work to the best of your ability
- Be punctual to the academy and to lessons and attend daily
- Ensure you have all the equipment needed for lessons, including your student planner and cashless system card
- Always wear the correct academy uniform and be tidy in appearance
- Look after the environment of our academy and our community as a whole
- Ensure your classwork and homework is well presented, completed to the best of your ability and handed in on time
- Behave appropriately at all times whether that is in the academy, arriving or leaving and when representing the academy in extra-curricular activities

Mobile Devices

Students are not allowed their phones out in school at any time, including break and lunch time. If your child needs to carry a phone to and from school that is fine, but please be aware that any child who has their phone out in school will have it confiscated for the remainder of the day in the first instance. There will be no warnings, the expectation is that phones are not seen at any time in the school building, this also includes headphones/earbuds etc. If they need to contact you during the school day then they must do this through the school office.

What happens if your child has a mobile device out in the school building?

- Your child will be directed to go to the main school reception to hand the device into a staff member
- The device will be stored for the day and your child can pick up the device at the end of the day
- If your child does not hand in the device to the main school reception, then appropriate sanctions will be put into place.
- If your child repeatedly breaches the mobile device expectations parents/carers will become involved.

STRIVE: Behaviour for Learning System

Students must realise that making good choices around positive learning behaviours will be rewarded, whilst making poor choices will have consequences. Our STRIVE system of consequences are as follows:

A student will be given two reminders to help them make the correct choice for learning. If after that they choose not to uphold the STRIVE learning standards, they will receive a **SAME DAY** correction **AFTER SCHOOL**. Students will be informed of the correction by the class teacher and we will make every effort to notify parents/carers, by text, of a same day correction before 2:45pm that day.

If a student receives more than one correction per day, then the amount of time spent in correction will increase in line with the number of corrections, see below:

1 correction	= 30 minutes
2/3 corrections	= 40 minutes
4/5 corrections	= 45 minutes

Should a student continue to make inappropriate choices, there will be an escalation of consequences as follows:

- Not attending the after school correction will result in a 45 minute detention after school the following day
- Failing or not attending the 45 minute detention will result in being isolated and spending the next day with the Form Tutor/Form Team
- Failing the isolation with the Form Tutor will result in a day in Retreat
- Failing a day in Retreat will result in a day in Retreat+
- Failing the day in Retreat+ will result in a fixed term exclusion from the academy.
- Should any student choose to exhibit extremely challenging behaviour (such as swearing at a member of staff) they will be immediately isolated with the form team and then spend the next day in Retreat.

Essential Equipment

Stationery

In addition to our academy uniform, all students are required to have essential equipment with them everyday. This includes; a pen(s), pencil(s), a ruler, a pencil case and a calculator. Items of stationery can also be purchased from Year Managers during Form Time each morning.

Student Planner

At the start of each academic year, every child will receive a student planner. The planner is an essential communication tool between home and school. There are sections for emergency contact details, personal and homework timetables, a weekly planner, absence notes and medical consent forms. Please take time to check your child's planner regularly. Replacement planners can be purchased from the school office.

Cashless System Card

Our academy operates a 'Cashless Catering System' where each student is issued with a card which they can credit with money at top-up machines throughout school. Each student receives their card in Year 7 and is expected to bring the card to school on a daily basis (food cannot be purchased in the canteen with cash). The card can be used to purchase food at breakfast, break and lunchtimes. If a student loses their cashless card, a replacement can be purchased from the canteen for the cost of £2.

Locker Hire

Should you wish your child to hire a locker for the academic year, September 2021 to July 2022, you must visit our website and complete a Locker Hire Request Form online. You'll find the form here: https://swinton.coopacademies.co.uk/primary-transition-2021

There is an is an extremely high demand for lockers in school and we cannot guarantee availability. Lockers are allocated on a 'first-come first-served' basis on the replies we receive. Your child will be notified during their first week in school if they have been successful. **Please note, this form is purely a request for your interest in a locker.** The cost to hire a locker for the full academic year is £7 which must be paid via our online payment system, *Scopay*.

Academy Uniform

Uniform shows that we are part of a community and by wearing it we respect our academy. Some uniform items can be bought at shops of your choice, however, certain items (marked *) can only be bought from Whittakers Schoolwear. Please ensure your child's name is marked clearly on every item of clothing and footwear.

- Academy blazer* blue with academy logo
- Academy jumper* (optional) grey v-neck with academy logo
- Shirt light blue, plain
- Academy tie* (clip-on style) available from Whittakers or our School Office
- Skirt* Trutex navy blue, stitch-down pleat (other skirts will not be accepted)
- Trousers black tailored trousers only (no cord or denim)
- Shoes plain black with NO additional colours (suitable black, low-heeled shoe, no trainers, boots or leisure shoes)
- Socks plain black (knee length for girls)
- Tights black (plain, not patterned)

Jewellery, Make-up and Hairstyles

- Jewellery For health and safety reasons, no jewellery is permitted. No piercings to be worn of any kind. This includes tongue piercings. Piercings will be asked to be removed irrespective of the length of time since the piercing was made. A wrist watch may be worn.
- Make-up No make-up of any kind to be worn. If a student is found to be wearing make-up, they will be asked to remove it using a wipe provided by school or soap and water.
- False nails or acrylic tips, whether they are plain or patterned will not be allowed. No nail varnish is to be worn.
- Hairstyles Excessively bright and unnatural colours (including streaks, braided extensions), tramlines and shaven patterns will NOT be allowed. This includes hair that has been shaven at different lengths, Mohican style haircuts or any unblended shaved patterns. The Head of Academy will have the final judgement to deem the hairstyle appropriate or inappropriate to school policy.
- Denim No denim (trousers, coats etc)

Hats and Coats

Students may wear winter hats in outdoor areas. Coats worn over the blazer may be worn in cold weather but must be taken off when inside the academy building.

PE kit

Correct kit must be worn for all PE lessons, even if your child is not participating. All students will be expected to take part, unless a valid note is produced, signed by a parent or carer. If a child has a medical condition which may affect their long term participation, then they may be asked to bring in a medical note or evidence from your family GP. Students will not be allowed to wear training shoes or socks for gymnastics. Students may wear navy tracksuit bottoms for PE lessons during periods of cold weather and at the teacher's discretion.

Attendance and Absence

Our attendance target for 2021/2022 is 96%.

Why is attendance important?

It is vital that your child attends school regularly and punctually in order to learn and progress. We believe that every lesson is important and that every day your child is absent has the potential to damage their achievement and affect their future.

Low attendance leads to underachievement and possible safeguarding concerns. Studies have shown that students with a higher percentage of attendance will simply achieve higher overall grades. Poor attendance can make the difference between a pass or fail, or being accepted onto their chosen college course or not.

Every day counts and every minute is important...did you know that being just 15 minutes late each day is the same as missing two whole weeks of learning? With your help we can reach our target!

Procedure for reporting your child's absence

Parents/carers have a responsibility to contact school on their child's first day of absence **BEFORE 8:30am** with an explanation and likely duration of absence. It is necessary for you to contact school each morning that your child is absent unless we have a doctor's note for a longer term illness. If we do not receive notification via telephone, text or App then the absence will be recorded as unauthorised. Our reception is open to take calls from 8am. Parents will be contacted, and home visits made if we do not receive any notification.





What can you do to help us?

Always keep us informed. If your child is unable to attend the academy, for whatever reason, please contact us **BEFORE 8:30am** to explain the reason for absence. Our reception is open to take calls from 8am.

We urge parents not to take students out of school unless absolutely necessary. Medical appointments should always be made outside of the school day or during holidays wherever possible. If your child has an unavoidable appointment during school time, we ask that you inform school and write a note in their Student Planner with, if possible an appointment card/letter. We would normally expect to see your child in school for the session before and after the appointment.

School should receive an explanation for every absence. Any unexplained absence will be classed as unauthorised. If you know in advance that your child will be absent eg. religious observance, please notify Mrs Craven, Social Inclusion Manager by either phone, email or *SIMS Parent App* as listed above.

All attendance will be monitored and any pattern of non-attendance, or a high number of unauthorised absences, may be referred to the Education Welfare Service and this may lead to legal action being taken against you. If a student has 10 or more unauthorised sessions a fixed penalty notice will be issued by Salford City Council. We also request that after 15 days of authorised absence a medical certificate/evidence is provided to support your child's absence. In addition to this, a medical planning meeting will be held. Failure to provide such evidence will result in the school involving the Education Welfare Service

Exceptional Circumstances Leave of Absence

In September 2013 The Department for Education (DfE) announced important amendments to legislation surrounding holidays in term time. The law now gives NO entitlement to parents to take their child on holiday during term time. Leave of absence during term time will only be granted under exceptional circumstances; this does not include family holidays, celebrations or weddings.

Any application for leave must be made to the Head of Academy who must be satisfied that the circumstances are exceptional and warrant the granting of leave. The Head of Academy's decision is final and cannot be appealed.

Medical Information

Accident or illness at school

Occasionally, students fall ill at school and not infrequently have accidents. Children who are feeling unwell during the school day must see their Year Manager or Pupil Progress Coordinator in the first instance and not contact parents themselves asking to be collected from the academy. Children will only be allowed to leave school for illness once authorised by the Pupil Progress Coordinator or Year Manager. Once authorised, a member of staff will contact parent/carer by telephone to confirm that someone is available to collect the student.

Students will NOT be allowed to leave the premises alone if they are unwell.

Sometimes, a child will require hospital attention and on such occasions they will usually be transported by ambulance, taken by parents or by staff car if no other transport is available. In such cases, we assure you that our staff will go to great lengths to ensure the child is properly cared for. Parents will be contacted as soon as possible. Sometimes, a considerable amount of time can be spent at the hospital and we ask that, apart from exceptional circumstances, parents take responsibility as soon as possible after being contacted.

It is very important that parents/carers complete and return the ANNUAL PARENTAL CONSENT FORM to us, giving details of:

- Home address and telephone number
- Alternative contact number (for emergency use only)
- Mother's/father's/carer's place of work and telephone number
- Name and address of family doctor
- Declaration of any disability or health condition eg. asthma

Please let your Pupil Progress Coordinator, Year Manager or the school office know of any change during the year. PLEASE DON'T FORGET, WE MIGHT NEED TO CONTACT YOU IN AN EMERGENCY!

On occasion, it has been the case that the school has been unable to contact a parent and medical attention has been urgently required by the student. This can occur during the normal school day or on day visits away from school. In the case of such an occurrence, we cannot sign any medical consent form on your behalf unless you have previously agreed to that, and we would ask you to complete the Annual Parental Consent Form and return this to the school.

Administration of medicines

Our *Medical Needs Policy* enables parents to visit the school office and give their authorisation for our staff to administer medicines to their child. In order for us to administer medicine to your child, you must complete and sign a 'Medical Consent Form' which can be requested from the school reception. A copy can also be found at the back of your child's Student Planner, or you can download a copy from our website at: https://swinton.coopacademies.co.uk/parents/medical-information/

When we administer medication to any student a 'Medical Log Form' is completed. For each administration, a member of staff will sign your child's log and also ask for the signature of your child as proof that they have been given the medicine and the time is recorded. The academy would not normally be expected to supervise routinely the treatment of all children who receive thrice-daily medication (eg, antibiotics or even anti-convulsant drugs) as the medication could be provided before and after school. The child's doctor will be able to advise whether dosage adjustments make this possible. Consideration will be given to enable a parent to come to the main office and administer the medication personally. Under no circumstances must any child carry on them any medication to administer personally. Where at all possible, please ensure the medication you send to school is in tablet and not liquid form as we have limited storage for medicines.

Please note: If your child has asthma, it is imperative that they carry their own inhaler with them at all times.

Operation Encompass

Operation Encompass is a police and education initiative to safeguard and support children and young people following a domestic abuse incident. When a child or young person has been involved in, or been exposed to a domestic incident, information is reported directly to the school's trained 'Key Adult' prior to the start of the next school day. Self Harm

The term 'self harm' means doing anything on purpose that causes harm to yourself. This can include; cutting, burning, overdosing or swallowing something dangerous or anything that causes harm to your body on purpose. At least 10% of adolescents report having self-harmed. Self harm is something that people do to help manage their emotions, what is sometimes called a 'coping strategy'. Young people can self harm for a number of reasons. The most common is to help them cope with their feelings in response to situations such as; depression, low self-esteem, drug or alcohol abuse, bullying, family problems, abuse (physical, emotional or sexual) plus many more.

How can you help? The most constructive way to deal with self harm is to stay calm, try not to be alarmed or show your fears. There are many things that can help: it may be that the individual needs structured therapy from a mental health professional, or that the compassionate support of family and friends is enough to aid their recovery. Prevent

Self Harm

Try going for a walk, keeping a diary or blog, doing some sport of physical exercise, listening to music, watching a movie or getting in touch with a friend.

Anti-bullying

Bullying is not tolerated at our academy. Before joining us, Year 6 will have been spoken to in their primary school by Miss Withers, Deputy Headteacher and the Pupil Progress Coordinator to allay any fears.

All our staff, students and parents work together to create a school community where bullying is not tolerated. We are committed to not only dealing with bullying, but to do all that we can to prevent it happening in the first place.

All our students should feel free from the threat of bullying and have the right to feel safe and secure. Students should know where to go and whom to speak to if bullying does occur. We will make students aware that all bullying concerns will be dealt with sensitively and effectively.

We expect a very high standard of self-discipline and behaviour from all our students and encourage students to adopt a caring and responsible attitude at all times. We pride ourself on two mottos - 'Strive to Achieve' and 'Respect'. These are the key principles of our academy ethos and are taught to our students in every aspect of academy life.

Our 'Seven Steps' Anti-Bullying Support Group Approach

In every year group we promote a 'support group approach'. All our staff have been trained to use the 'Seven Steps Approach' when dealing with incidents of bullying.

The 'Seven Steps Approach' focuses on not attaching blame to a particular person or group, but it aims to change the behaviour of the bully as well as creating a safe and secure environment for the victim.

If a student has an issue with bullying in school then they must inform a member of staff who will be able to help them and offer support.

- **Stage 1:** Seven Steps (no parental involvement)
- **Stage 2:** Parental involvement
- Stage 3: Outside agencies

Next measures: When the bullying is serious or escalates further we also use; Retreat, Retreat+ and possible permanent exclusion.



Report the incident to any member of staff. They will then get someone to speak to you.

Step 2

The member of staff will then arrange a meeting with those who have been involved in the bullying.

Step 3

staff will explain to the group how you are feeling. They will not attach blame to anyone. They will emphasise that you just want the bullying to stop.

After explaining the problem, the member of staff will tell them that they have a responsibility to stop the bullying and make your life happier in school. Together they will work to stop the problem. Step 5

The member of staff will ask the group for their ideas as to how they can stop the bullying. Step 6

The teacher will pass on responsibility to the group to solve the problem and will arrange to meet the group individually the following week.

Step 7

The teacher will meet all the students individually, including the bully and the victim to discuss how things have been going.

Extra-curricular Activities

We firmly believe that education doesn't belong solely in the classroom, but is a whole life experience. We have a multitude of 'extra' activities that not only widen learning experiences but also make academy life more enjoyable. We have regular visits to the theatre, cinema, concerts, museums and factories, both during and after academy hours. We visit relevant exhibitions on a regular basis and we invite external visitors to talk to our students on various subjects. We also organise annual trips and exchanges abroad.

All our faculties take an active part in extra-curricular life and offer an enormous range of after-academy activities. Below are some of the example clubs we have running at any one time, although these are subject to change periodically throughout the academic year;

Science Club, Homework Club, Street Dance, Cheerleading, Art, Photography, Gifted Readers, Drum Club, Rounders, Boxing, Softball, Weightlifting, Basketball, Girls' and Boys' Football, ICT and more!

Student Council

Our Student Council is the inspiring student voice of our academy. It consists of two students per Form Group and, chosen from these are, four Year Councillors representing each Year Group.

Each half-term, the Council debates and discusses issues which are important to students as determined by the Form Councillors. It makes recommendations to the Head of Academy around school issues such as; school improvement, teaching and learning, rewards and whole school policies.

Our Council is a vital part of our school community. In recent years, our Student Council have:

- Organised fundraising activities for various charities including; Mary's Meals, Cancer Research UK,
 British Heart Foundation, Once Upon a Smile and Just a Drop raising more than £10,000 since 2015!
- Devised our student 'STRIVE' values
- Organised and distributed Harvest Festival packages for various community projects
- Assisted in the recruitment of new staff
- Helped to introduce additional rewards trips subsidised by our School Governing Body
- Helped to introduce new sporting activities
- Helped to introduce new prizes for our Achievement and Attendance Rewards including; iPods, iPads and various vouchers

Peer Mentoring

Peer Mentoring is a service in school that is run by our Year 10 students who have been trained to become mentors for students in Year 7. A peer mentor is a sort of 'friend' who helps younger students by giving them guidance and advice, as well as being a listening ear. Students may request a Peer Mentor for a variety of reasons. They may; want help to give them encouragement, want to talk to someone older than themselves, be lacking in confidence or be worried about coming to school.

Students who are selected to be Peer Mentors receive full training around support, confidentiality and child protection and are taught how to deal with difficult situations.

Nurture Group

Nurture groups are an approach to inclusion designed to open up learning for children who are struggling for a variety of reasons. Our Nurture groups provide a safe base, helping students cope with the demands of a secondary school, especially those with transition from primary to secondary school. They usually take the form of a small discrete class, offering a safe, structured and predictable environment.

Our Nurture provision provides short-term, targeted intervention for children with social, emotional and behavioural difficulties which are creating a barrier to learning within a mainstream class. Each Nurture group consists of a maximum of eight students, selected from Year 6 or Year 7 students who are identified by SEND or pastoral staff.

As the children learn academically and socially, they develop confidence, become responsive to others, learn self-respect and take pride in behaving well and in achieving. This has a real impact on the development of their ability to fit into a secondary school environment and form positive adult and/or peer relationships.

In 2008, we were proud to receive the Kitemark standard for the work that we do in this field. Kitemark is a quality mark that recognises the outstanding practice that goes on with our Nurture groups. It is extremely difficult to achieve this award and we are now recognised as a leader within this field.

Catering

We take great pride in the food we serve in our academy, healthy eating and healthy living are very important to us. All food is cooked on the premises and many ingredients are sourced from local suppliers.

We offer a wide selection of balanced and nutritious, hot and cold foods during our break time and lunchtime services.

Our lunches are served on a 3-week rotating menu with choices including wraps and sandwiches, pasta dishes, jacket potatoes, a variety of hot main courses, desserts and drinks. Students may also bring their own packed lunch and a section of the dining room is set aside for their use.

Cashless Catering

Our academy operates a 'Cashless Catering System' where each student is issued with a card which they can credit with money at top-up machines throughout school. Each student receives their card in Year 7 and is expected to bring the card to school on a daily basis (food cannot be purchased in the canteen with cash). The card can be used to purchase food at break and lunchtimes. If a student loses their cashless card, a replacement can be purchased from the canteen for the cost of £2.

Free School Meals

Students who are entitled to 'free school meals' are automatically credited with the value of £2.25 to their cashless card at 1pm of each academy day. Curriculum

We are proud of our school and the community it serves. Our ambition is for students to make their mark in the world whilst sustaining strong associations to their heritage; consequently, removing any sense of geographical disadvantage.

We believe that the breadth and quality of the curriculum is central to the ongoing achievement, progress and motivation of our students. Our curriculum is innovative, challenging and fulfilling to enable each student to achieve their full potential.

We are creating an ever evolving knowledge rich curriculum, delivering consistency of implementation across our school whilst facilitating effective assessment, including the use of retrieval and recall activities. We have explored and continue to embed a curriculum with every concept broken down into granular items of knowledge to be mastered. We believe greater specificity of knowledge supports purposeful teacher autonomy within a set of common expectations and shared standards. Too little specificity undermines clarity and pupil entitlement. Every child is entitled to a rich wealth of knowledge.

We adopt a rigorous programme of literacy intervention to support our academy pledge that every child has a reading age of 10.5 or more by the end of Year 7. This ensures that our students can all access the opportunities that our modern curriculum presents to them.

Our school operates a three-year Key Stage 3 in Years 7, 8 and 9. Guided option choices are made in Year 9 and students are given every support and encouragement to pursue subjects aligned to their abilities and interests. Curriculum Evenings

We hold a Curriculum Evening for our Year 7 during their first year with us. The evening is designed to inform you about what your child will be studying over the course of the year. There are presentations from our Directors of Learning of the EBacc subjects and Pupil Progress Coordinator of the Year Group. The evening is an important event as it allows you to learn how you can ensure that your child makes the best possible progress they can.

Academy Organisation

On entering Co-op Academy Swinton, children are placed in a mixed ability form group. These units are not too large, usually about 25 students. All the forms of the same age group make up a Year Group which is the responsibility of a Pupil Progress Coordinator and Year Manager. They are the members of staff who collect all the information – social, behavioural and academic, concerning your child. It is to the Pupil Progress Coordinator and Year Manager that any personal information, problems involving your child or enquiries should be directed in the first instance.

Our subjects are covered by ten faculties. They are;

English: English Language, English Literature, Media, French and Spanish

Maths: Mathematics

Science: Science and Separate Sciences

Humanities: History, Geography, Religious Studies and PSHCE **Modern Foreign Languages:** French, Spanish and Mandarin

ICT: Business Studies, Computing - Computer Science and Creative Media Products

PE: PE and Sports Studies **Arts:** Art and Photography **Technology:** Design Technology

Performing Arts: Performing Arts, Drama, Music and Music Technology

Homework

We believe homework is a necessary part of the education we provide. It trains students to work independently and encourages them to develop the study and research skills necessary for today's form of examinations.

Homework is set for all students for each weekday evening. Your support as parents is absolutely essential and we ask you most sincerely to take an interest in the standard and presentation of the work submitted.

During Key Stage 3, homework normally occupies at least one to one and a half hours each evening, increasing to two hours or more in Upper School. If your child is usually spending either far more time than this or far less, please draw the matter to our attention.

Each student will receive a Student Planner for them to enter all homework they are given. Parents/carers are asked to check and sign it each week. If your child is not completing homework, this will be recorded by the subject teacher in the Student Planner. Students will receive corrections if homework has not been completed, or is not completed to an acceptable standard.

Much of the homework that children will receive is set, and completed, online using Google Classroom (children will be set up with a school Google account during their first week here).


Homework during Year 7

For their first half-term with us, Year 7s are not given daily or weekly homework, but instead are set the task of creating a 'project' based on a topic of their choice which they are then asked to present at an annual event where we invite parents/carers to join us. During their second term, homework will focus specifically on English, Maths and Science moving on to all subjects starting in term three.

How can you help your child with homework?

Type of homework	What your child does	What you can do to help
Learning	The job is to remember certain words, facts, details or rules.	Act as a question master or a tester.
Completing	Work already started in school is to be finished at home.	Look at the whole piece of work and perhaps make useful comments. Ask what the whole task is about.
Writing up	Your child will use homework time to write about work done in school or write a finished version of rough work done in school.	Again, look at the whole piece or, even better, talk about it briefly first, to get the work clearly ingrained in your child's mind and jog their memory.
Questions	A matter of answering questions after a lesson's work.	Check the answers. Do they give the exact information wanted in the questions?
Finding Out	A matter of answering questions after a lesson's work. Searching for information on a given subject. Part of this homework might be done in the school library/resource centre in the student's own time.	Don't do too much for them here! But encourage and help when they are stuck. It is obviously better to suggest where they might find the information than find it for them.
Revision	Quite simply a matter of learning a section of work for a test or an examination.	Get your child to explain the work to you. You ask the questions once they are ready. You can even 'mark' the answers if you like
Reading Ahead	Reading on ahead in a text book to get some ideas of what work is to come - and be ready for it.	Be aware of what they are doing in the subject at the moment; be interested in what your child has found out.
Rough Work	Here, the students are asked to prepare for a lesson to come by putting ideas or information down on rough paper.	Suggest a starting point perhaps. Once finished, ask them to read the work to you. Even if it is rough the rules of spelling and punctuation still apply.
